GET INTO IT: A MATRIC DANCE CONTROVERSY

 Cape, one Grade 12 learner was banned from attending this special event because she was caught kissing
 her boyfriend on school premises. Her mother argued that she should not be banned and requested a court
 case to argue against the ban. The court argued in favour of the school's decision.




Poll question:
